

IN MEMORIAM

Tim Kirkby



Sadly, after a long and courageous battle with illness, Tim Kirkby passed away on 14 May surrounded by his family. Tim was a member of the club for 23 of his 28 years, having joined the club's nipper program as an U6 in the 1997/98 season. Twenty three years later he left as one of the club's best ever board paddlers, winning medals at Branch, State and Australian level and was a Branch team representative. Along the way he became entrenched in club life as a patrolling member, a patrol captain and over the past 5 seasons as one of the club's board coaches. He was named the club's outstanding board competitor 5 times, was awarded the club's Youth Scholarship Award in 2011 as well as a Prominent Service Award in 2015. His greatest legacy was his dedication and commitment to the board, ski & swim section of the club, particularly in relation to the mentoring of the club's younger members. He will be sadly missed. Vale Tim.

Kay Priday passed away on 9 February aged 86. Kay was a long time member of the club's Women's Auxiliary Committee throughout the 1970's and 1980's. She was also a foundation member of the nippers at Freshwater in 1966 when it was a separate junior club. She served as nippers' registrar for many years at both club and Branch level. She also acted as chaperone for Interstate teams.

She was actively involved in a range of administrative, social and support functions at the club. Her dedication to the nippers' movement is recognised by the club via the Kay Priday Encouragement Award which is presented annually to a boy and girl in each of the age groups from Under 8 to Under 14. Vale Kay.





Nigel Thomas



It was with shock and disbelief that members learned of the sudden passing of Nigel Thomas while on holiday in Thailand with his family aged 56. Nigel joined the club in 2009 and quickly became immersed in surf club life. With children in the nippers, he offered his support wherever he could, including obtaining his Bronze Medallion and IRB crew certificate so he could assist with water safety duties. When his children ceased their involvement with the club, he continued to be an active patrolling member on patrol 1. Vale Nigel.

Sadly, Graeme Knox, former club member and celebrated member of the surf boat fraternity, passed away on 27 May at the age of 73. Known universally as "Zombie" or "the Zom", he was the son of club legend Harry Knox but did not take long to take on his own legendary status both within the club and the wider surf lifesaving movement. A larger than life character, Zom was an accomplished boat rower, winning an Australian bronze medal for the club in the Junior boat event in 1963/64. He was the tour manager for the club's tour to England and Wales in 1974 and was the tour liaison officer for the reciprocal tours by Welsh teams in 1980 and again in 1984. He was the organiser and driving force for the annual Brewarrina to Bourke Outback Classic boat event first held in 1988. His love of surfboats continued throughout his years in lifesaving. He was responsible for the introduction of a range of initiatives which are now common practice in relation to surf boat competition. He was a boat official and announcer for 20 years, wrote a column on



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

ALAN BURNS President

Like all clubs in the SNB branch, the 2019/20 season has proven to be an incredibly testing one for all. Although we are not yet through the latest health crisis, I am reminded of just how proud I am to be a member of the Emergency Services Organisation and specifically, a member of Australian Surf Life Saving.

The season had only just begun when we saw and experienced the effects of the bushfires that ravaged much of our State and resulted in so much destruction and sadly. loss of life. Much has been said and written on the devastation and loss of life but all Freshwater Surf Club members should be very proud to be a part of the Surf Club movement that responded with such generosity to the plight of our fellow Australians. In particular, our firefighters and emergency services personnel have truly embodied what we know as the Anzac Spirit, first defined during the First World War - that is, the capacity of ordinary humans to do extraordinary things when coupled with extreme circumstance - to fight harder, to march further, to dig deeper, to move despite overwhelming odds, no matter the personal imposition or risk – even if that risk

means death. This is the Anzac spirit. It is a spirit that spans generations, defines what mateship means and drives us to be more than we ever imagined we could be.

We had only just begun to recover from the effects of the bushfires when we had to face the devastation of the flooding in the northern beaches and then the current COVID-19 pandemic. At the time of writing, we look to be recovering from this also and again, the heroism of our emergency services personnel has been on display from the beginning.

It is an understatement to say the past season has been an eventful one. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we have been forced to close the club for the first time in our existence, our Annual Presentation Night has been cancelled and the Annual General Meeting deferred. Additionally, all patrols were suspended on the 22nd of March. the National Surf Titles were not able to be held and nor were the Club Championships. the first time since 1928. Due to the closure of the club, our income has been reduced to nil from hall hire and now it has been provisionally reopened, more rigorous cleaning measures have had to be instigated



and will need to be adhered to for the foreseeable future.

Our thoughts, prayers and supporting wishes go out to all the families of those members who passed away during this past season. Even in this time of sadness, it was lovely to see the tremendous number of members who lined the streets around the club to pay their respects to Tim Kirkby on his final lap around the carpark. For his family to see all those members coming together as one, many holding boards, boat oars and club flags will long be remembered and hopefully brought a small amount of joy into what was a very sad occasion. The passing of anyone diminishes us all and perhaps some comfort can be taken from the fact that so long as they remain in our hearts and minds, they have never really left us. Vale Tim, Kay, Zom and Nigel.

We are fortunate as a club to have Dierk Hartmann in the role of Club Captain during this time. Dierk expressed his views on the dangers of the COVID-19 pandemic and the need for self isolation and social distancing very forcefully to Branch early on and it is fair to say he provided much needed leadership to Branch by withdrawing our patrols from the beach



on the 22nd March after the Police closed the beach. Our 424 active patrolling members again ensured our beach remains one of the safest beaches in NSW, allowing us to continue with our amazing safety record.

I have said many times before, the effective administration of our club is a huge undertaking and we are so fortunate to have the services of Wayne Freakley as our Executive Officer performing this role. Unless and until you have had the experience of working with Wayne on the Committee, it is difficult to appreciate the level of professionalism and experience he brings to this role.

Some of his duties include recording and publishing Minutes of our Committee meetings, completing annual returns to Branch, NSW and SLSA. He co-ordinates preparation of our Annual Report, submits annual returns to Dept Fair Trading & National Charities Commission. He also enters patrol logs for our 424 patrolling members and updates member records including service history, competition history, awards and positions held. He also chairs our Governance panel which annually reviews our By-Laws and Constitution and he co-ordinates the Honours Panel for the preparation of internal and external awards nominations. He regularly reviews Circulars and Bulletins issued by Branch, NSW &

SLSA and brings relevant content to the appropriate Director. He prepares water safety risk assessment forms and is the Work Health & Safety Officer as well as the Member Protection Officer. He also prepares submissions & representations to Branch reflecting concerns about the operation of the club, particularly in light of the COVID-19 situation. I am so very pleased to see he has again indicated his desire to remain in his role for another season. This would be his 13th year as a member of the EC and his 12th as Executive Officer. Thank you also to both Gayle Taylor and Michal Brenchley for the enormous amount of work they perform on behalf of the club, assisting Wayne in handling our administrative tasks.

The reporting requirements of our club and in particular those relating to finance, continue to increase and our Treasurer, Chris Tyrrell, spends many hours ensuring we are compliant. You have only to look at the detail contained in the Financial Reports to realise the complexity and depth of what is required to recognise the value of Chris in this role.

Our Education Team under the leadership of Jackie Phillips has again provided an enormous contribution to our club and thank you to all those dedicated and committed trainers who have assisted her. This year the club attained 171 awards, ran 8 formal proficiencies putting 428 members through their Bronze medallion, Surf Rescue Certificate and Advanced Resuscitation Certificate proficiencies. Proficiencies were also undertaken for 72 IRB Crew and 29 Drivers, 10 Spinal Management, 6 Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue and 7 Rescue Water Craft Operator. Further details of awards can be found in Jackie's report.

Mary-Louise Parkinson has continued to excel in the very difficult and time consuming Sponsorship and Marketing Portfolio and she is a walking example of the adage, "the harder I work, the more success I have". She has continued to build on our relationships with all our major sponsors and continues to provide a worthwhile contribution during this difficult time.

Congratulations to Kev Crow on the manner in which he has handled the Sport Director's portfolio. I'd like to thank him personally for his contribution over the past 3 seasons as he is stepping down this year but it hasn't stopped him always being available to offer advice and tips on technique to our up and coming ski paddlers.

Under the leadership of our Junior Activities Chairman, Paul McGettigan and his committee, we saw an



increase in Nipper numbers this past season to 800, making Freshwater the largest contingent of Nippers in the Branch. At the time of writing, we are still experiencing various restrictions on gatherings and social distancing. How this will affect the annual membership numbers of the Nippers next season is unknown but Paul and his team are working on different plans for different scenarios.

Former Nipper Chairman, Sam Di Sano, took on the position as Youth Development Officer and as with most other areas within SLS, his portfolio was abruptly curtailed mid season. It is vital for our continued success as a club to develop effective pathways for our Junior members into the Senior club and the EC is fully supportive of Sam's efforts to develop those pathways.

Michal Brenchley is tireless as our Member Services Director and has organised a number of successful club functions from Freshies on Fridays to our annual Life Members function and various Nipper functions. Her role is to provide avenues to all club members to enjoy the club and she is looking forward to continuing with this role in the upcoming 20/21 Season.

As our Director of Facilities, Phil Fagan's focus has been on maintaining the facilities and a full report of his activities can be found later in his report. This is Phil's 9th year in this role and he has decided to step down to give someone else an opportunity to enjoy the position. Thanks Phil for all your work during your tenure.

Due to the severe disruption to our season, I don't want members to think it has all been doom and gloom. There have been many highlights: We are continuing to liaise with Council on the relocation of our office to a purpose built office space on the mezzanine deck and our leaking roof is no longer an issue.

The EC has again decided to offer a refund of the annual membership fee to all IRB drivers and Patrol Captains as a way of saying thank you for undertaking such difficult and time consuming roles. We were also successful in forcing a vote at the Board of Surf Sports (BOSS) to reduce the percentage of the competition entry fee retained by Branch from 42% to 25% for all Open and Masters carnivals.







My most poignant memory of the 2019/20 season was the Armistice Day ceremony in November when "the Freshwater tree and Remembrance plague were unveiled on the corner of Soldiers Ave and Oliver St, Freshwater, honouring the 16 fallen Surf Club members who paid the ultimate price for our freedom during WMI. Various dignitaries were present, including the Governor of NSW, Margaret Beazley and the 16 fallen members were represented by 16 young club members, resplendent in patrol uniforms, each placing a poppy in remembrance at the base of the tree.

As always, the Harbord Beach Hotel, with proprietors John Thorpe AM and Trish King and their GM, Sean King deserve special mention as the hotel has been our major supporter for 43 years and we are so thankful for their generosity over this time. The Hotel was sold in January to a consortium headed by Glenn Piper, Lachlan Cottee and Michael Ternes and while we welcome their involvement, we are sad to see the end of such a strong partnership with 'Thorpey' and wish John, Trish and Sean all the best for the future.

Of course, we are also fortunate to have the support of Michael Phillips, GM of the Harbord Diggers Club (part of the Mounties Group) and its Board of Directors, the local branch of the Community bank, the Bendigo Bank, Nature's Care, the providers of the Healthy Care range of health related products, Network 10, Smyth Estate Agency, Bennett Surfboards and we trust their support will continue for many years to come.

Thanks to all the members of the EC and club members who have provided me with support during the season and I look forward to seeing you all on the beach for the 2020/21 season.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

WAYNE FREAKLEY Executive Officer

It goes without saying this season has been one unlike any which has preceded it. For the first time in the club's history, patrolling activities were terminated early and the club was placed in complete lockdown at the end of March. Not even two world wars and the Great Depression required this level of response to a national crisis. As at the date this report was prepared, it is still uncertain when the club will return to normal operations.

Membership

This year saw an increase in membership numbers across most of the major membership categories. A reduction in the number of cadet members was more than made up for by increases in junior activity, active juniors, active seniors and nipper parent members. Our total membership of 1911 represented an increase of approximately 8.1%, was our highest membership total since the 2016/17 season and our 5th largest overall.

As in previous years, obtaining consistent membership data remains a challenge because of the vagaries of the Surfguard system. Differing membership totals are arrived at depending on which reporting mechanism in Surfguard is used. That this remains an issue more than a decade after the introduction of Surfguard remains frustrating in the extreme.

The table opposite provides a breakdown of the traditional membership base for the 2019/20 season based on the reporting system relied on by the club for the past 10 years.



Based on the latest membership figures provided by NSW (Jan 2020), the club now has the largest overall membership in the Branch, the largest nipper contingent and the 5th highest number of patrolling members. As can be seen

from the table below (which is based on a different reporting system used by NSW and thus explains the difference in our reported numbers), our membership numbers in key areas are well above the Branch average:

Executive Committee

Those meetings were conducted remotely via Zoom and despite a couple of minor hiccoughs, were very successful.

A combination of improved efficiencies and the use of technology meant the time taken to transact monthly business was generally less than in previous years. In order to improve transparency and consistency in the use of club funds and to ensure compliance with relevant financial obligations, a review of the club's financial procedures was commenced during the season. This is intended to be an on-going review which will examine a range of processes and procedures associated with the receipt, safekeeping, investment and expenditure of club funds. The first part of the process has seen the introduction of new financial expenditure procedures which deal with a range of issues, including –

- Delegations to incur expenditure
- Expenditure approval procedures including the obtaining of quotes
- The approval of authorised providers of goods and services in lieu of seeking quotes each time goods are required or services needed
- Establishment of trade accounts and the authorisation of members to utilise the accounts
- Provisions for the on-going review of the procedures.

In accordance with the constitution, the By-Laws were reviewed by the club's Governance Panel during the July – September period to confirm their on-going relevance. Membership Records

Work has continued throughout the season to bring membership records up to date in respect of –

- years of service
- official positions held both within the club and other lifesaving entities
- club awards and other forms of recognition
- competition results for championship and other special events

As has been previously noted, it is a time consuming task and it will take some years to complete. Unfortunately in years past, maintaining clear and accurate membership records was not necessarily given a high priority. This has resulted in many information gaps in the areas of positions held, awards and recognition and competition results.

Water Safety Policy and work health and safety

The club continues to utilise the simplified combined risk assessment form for all water based activities. This season a separate assessment document was initiated for the boat section in recognition of their unique circumstances. Overall compliance with the SLSA & legal requirements was much improved this season. Forms were generally completed when required and only a small number of members had difficulty complying with the requirement to wear high viz vests during training sessions.

The COVID-19 crisis required the club to implement more rigid cleaning regimes for the premises, particularly in relation to the gym. These arrangements were however short lived as a result of the complete shutdown of the club in accordance with government directions. During the course of the pandemic, steps were taken to implement a staged re-opening of the club in accordance with relevant government and health directives. At the date of this report that process is on-going. As part of that process it has also been necessary to develop separate COVID Safe plans for the different areas of the club.

The area of work, health and safety as it applies to club operations remains an on-going concern and more work is needed in this area. All members need to be vigilant to ensure safety protocols are being followed. Non-compliance with SLSA procedures and WH&S legislation has potentially significant ramifications for both the club and individual members, particularly in relation to insurance cover.

Club merchandise

As part of a review of club merchandise procedures, responsibility for this area of club operations was transferred to the Executive Officer. This review was designed to centralise and improve the development, ordering, selling, maintenance and stock taking of all club merchandise. With Michal Brenchley taking charge of the day to day process on a paid basis one day per week, the new arrangements also addressed the need to ensure Michal's position as Director Member Services was not compromised by her taking on the new role.

As part of the changes, a new shop capable of storing all club merchandise was created in the storage area previously used for the club's chairs and tables in the Kooloora Room.

The new approach has seen encouraging gains in efficiencies and financial returns to the club. There has been a marked improvement in stock control. While a backlog of superceded clothing still remains, this will gradually be reduced over the coming seasons to a more manageable level. Despite the improvements made, old habits die hard and there continued to be incidences of people bypassing the new arrangements and ordering clothing without proper approval. As new arrangements become more ingrained, hopefully this problem will come to an end next season.

General Administration

Administrative obligations continue to increase in number and complexity and the associated paperwork continued its growth. Each of the levels of surf lifesaving administration – Branch. State and SLSA – has specific requirements in relation to the provision of reports and information. There is also a range of government agencies which, in accordance with legislation, the club is obliged to either report to or maintain records for – Department of Fair Trading, Department of Industry, Australian Charities and Not for Profit Commission. One Music, NSW Children's Guardian & ICare to name a few.

An extensive re-organisation of old records was undertaken during the season with a significant volume of records being disposed of via security waste bins. All old records are retained for 8 years prior to destruction, which is 12 months longer than the 7 year period recommended by SLSNSW. Any records of historical significance are retained.

The office arrangements currently see Michal Brenchley working two days per week, with one of those days devoted solely to merchandise. Combined with Gayle Taylor's 4 days per week, it means the club is able to offer administrative support throughout the working week. These arrangements have however highlighted the inadequacies of the current office area. The need to move the office to a new location better suited to housing 2 people as well as the office infrastructure necessary to support them is crucial. Hopefully the current plans of council to enclose the upper outside veranda area will allow the office to move there and thus solve the problem, at least in the short to medium term.

The surfguard system continued to be used to send out routine and special notices to the general membership electronically. A physical mail out continues to be used for those members without email addresses. We have continued to push the online membership renewal process however problems still arise because some members do not follow the instructions properly.

Special Thanks

As always I have to pay special thanks to Gayle & Michal for their on-going support over the past 12 months. Between them, Gayle & Michal attend to the vast majority of administrative tasks associated with the operation of the club, including responsibility for functions and hall hire.

This has been a particularly challenging year as a result of re-organisation of work and the COVID-19 crisis. Neither complains about any request made of them and they constantly go beyond their stated roles to ensure the club continues to function properly. I could not undertake the role of Executive Officer, and the club would not operate as smoothly, without their support.

As always my wife Jane also deserves special thanks. She continues to accommodate the many hours I spend in "my office" pounding away on the computer and attending meetings on a range of club related tasks. She also has to put up with me being involved with a range of Branch & State related matters. I could not do the job without her support.

The club's Executive Committee believes it is important we take the opportunity to wish them both a happy and healthy retirement. We sincerely thank them for their incredible support which has contributed to making our club what it is today. We would also like to wish Sean and his family all the best for the future.



Well what a year of ups and downs. During the 2019 / 2020 season the club experienced increased membership across almost all categories, the club shop experienced improved revenue our annual carnival & ocean swim revenue was strong. We were experiencing increased revenue from our hall hire activities all of which were contributing towards a very strong 2019/2020 financial year end, and then the world caught a cold.

COVID-19 took its toll on club revenue, however, as you will note in the attached accounts, it has not had a massive impact on the financial strength of our great club. I put this down to some years of prudent financial management and the overall professionalism and financial control of club funds pre-dating my time as Treasurer. The club remains financially strong and able to withstand a prolonged period of "no" income.

As a result of the COVID-19 crisis and due to our strong financial position, the club was in a position to offer our major tenant "Salt Bush Café" rental relief until the official end of their tenure on 31st July 2020. I am of the belief this was a good decision for all involved as it demonstrated the community support we as a club should be delivering and the Café was indeed very grateful.

The club applied for and received the Government Cash Flow Boost and Jobkeeper allowance payments in order to keep our valued staff members employed as Club revenue basically dried up. The club could not hire our spaces out for functions and could not enjoy our regular bookings as the EC was forced to close the



club until further notice. During this period the EC also agreed to a complete cessation of all discretionary spending. As a result, the club is set for a prolonged period of disruption "if" in fact we experience a prolonged period where income is reduced or worse. The club would need to experience no income for a period of 12 months before our working capital runs out and a further 24 months before we are in any form of distress.

Freshwater SLSC is in good shape.

I must thank the EC for their support this year. Once again we had a committee who were all on the same page and were supportive of each other during a difficult end of year period. I must also thank Steve Bennett & Steve Davis who make up the Finance Committee for their ongoing support. Both individuals always make themselves available for counsel with any pressing decision and for that I thank you both.

Once again, the unsung hero in my role is my wife Lisa Tyrrell. Lisa maintains the MYOB Accounting package for the club, she inputs 3000 entries each year and reconciles the club finances each month as well as assisting in the preparation of end of year club financial reports. Not sure how she finds time to be a world class March Past competitor. Lisa you are a legend.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Financial Commentary

During the 2019/2020 financial year the club experienced income of \$574,694 which was basically on par with the previous year's income, however, during the month of March & April our revenue was substantially reduced due to COVID-19.

After all expenses the club demonstrated a profit of \$58,070 which is a large improvement from the previous year's result. This improved performance can be attributed to the Executive Committee spending controls and improved trading across a number of sectors. You will note that depreciation of \$55,156 was expensed and as this is not a cash item, our profit for the year would be increased to \$113,226 which is a very strong result.

The Balance sheet attached will show a strong asset position and the club has no debts, hence, we are in a very sound financial position regardless of the uncertain economic climate.

I acknowledge that some members may find it difficult to assess the financial reports in the format that the Auditors have produced them. Hence I have attached a detailed profit and loss statement that will break down our trading into a more friendly format.

It has once again been a privilege to be a part of the Executive Committee this year and it has been a joy working with the other members and serving this great club. I look forward to a better 2020/21 season.

Principal activities and significant changes in nature of activities

The principal activities of Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club Inc during the financial year were to provide surf life saving services.

There were no significant changes in the nature of Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club Inc's principal activities during the financial year.

Review of operations

Total revenue increased by \$1,997 mainly due to increase in grants/assistance received. Operating expenses decreased by \$57,033 mainly due to decrease touring fund accommodation expenses and increase in closing stock. As a result, the Club recorded a net profit of \$58,071 (2019: (\$961)). Net assets increased to \$825,513 reflecting the operating profit result and net cash position increased by \$50,221 to \$472,589.

Matters or circumstances arising after the end of the year

Due to the current situation in relation to Coronavirus (COVID-19), the business and economic environment is extremely uncertain. On 11 March 2020, the World Health Organisation declared the Coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak to be a pandemic in recognition of its rapid spread across the globe, with over 150 countries now affected. Governments are taking increasingly stringent steps to help contain or delay the spread of COVID-19. Due to these circumstances, there is a significant increase in business and economic uncertainty, which is for example, evidenced by more volatile markets,

Except for the above, no other matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or could significantly affect the operations of the Company, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Company's in future financial years.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 April 2020

The financial report covers Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club Inc as an individual entity. Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club Inc is a not-for-profit Club, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The principal activities of the Club for the year ended 30 April 2020 were providing surf life saving services.

The functional and presentation currency of Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club Inc is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by those charged with governance on 18th June 2020.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Club is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Club and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Membership fees

Annual fees for membership are recognised in the year that the revenue relates to.

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

(c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(d) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

(e) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for nil or nominal consideration have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Club, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

Fixed asset class	Depreciation rate
Buildings and improvements	5%-20%
Plant and Equipment	10%-33%
Heritage Centre	2.5%

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

(f) Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Club determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where an indicator exists and regardless for indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(h) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Club's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

Those charged with governance make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible.

Going Concern

The current situation in relation to Covid-19 has created a business and economic environment which is extremely uncertain.

All operations of the Club have been shut down due to government restrictions which has resulted in substantially reduced cash flows in some areas of operation. The Directors have carried out a substantial review of the expected cash flows of the Club over the next 12 months, taking into account the expected impacts of continuing restrictions.

Based on this review, and the also on the substantial cash reserves that the Club has available, the Directors consider that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Should the Club be unable to continue as a going concern, it may be required to realise its assets and liabilities other than in the ordinary course of business, and at amounts that differ from those stated in the financial statements. The financial statements do not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts, or to the amount and classification of liabilities that might be required should the Company not be able to achieve the matters set out above and thus be able to continue as a going concern

DIERK HARTMANN Director Lifesaving

On behalf of Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club, I would like to extend my gratitude to all actively patrolling members who volunteered their time to keep our beach safe. You are all contributing to making Freshwater Beach one of the most popular beaches on the Northern Beaches and providing a greatly appreciated community service.

I would like to congratulate Andrea Malm and Jordon Dobson for their first successfully completed season as Patrol Captains. Jordon stood out for most prosaic patrol reminders and for withdrawing the patrol from the beach on 22 March as crowds built up to more than the allowed limit of 500 people that morning. A mature decision from a young Patrol Captain. Great leadership Jordon – impressive!

After ten years of active service, of which he spent six years as Patrol Captain, Michael Wright is retiring from Patrol 11. Michael's structured approach has been commended as exemplary by the patrols who had the honour of being led by him. Apparently, many of the applied leadership techniques are the result of ardent study of Dad's Army, a program us other Patrol Captains may have to re-watch, or watch for the first time, while we are still in self-isolation.


Saying that this was not a normal season may be the understatement of the year. While we had ominous signs that our lives were about to change – four months without rain leading to a drought, severe bush-

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fires bringing tragedy to families in regional NSW and taking an unimaginable toll on our wildlife – but, nothing could prepare us for what was in store next.

I think 2020 will remain in our collective memory. Not just for a surf life saving season cut short, but also for HSC preparations via video links, gap years spent at home with parents and siblings, university courses not completed, jobs lost, businesses shut, everyone's IT skills dramatically improved. There are rumours that some members are honing their skills in the kitchen with some are even making bread. Maybe new careers?

By mid-March, government put laws in place that limited the attendance of events to a maximum of 500 people. At the same time, we decided to limit patrol numbers to minimum requirements reducing the risk of infection to our members and their families. With beach attendance well in excess of 1,000 people we found ourselves not just in breach of the newly introduced law, it also became apparent that we could no longer safeguard the public with minimum patrol sizes. The mere presence of Life Guards and Life Savers on the beach appeared to attract more visitors.

It was a difficult decision to recommend calling an early end to the season and to withdraw our patrols to a watching brief, thereby fully handing responsibility to the Council Life Guards who did a valiant job maintaining a safe environment. At the time, this felt like abandoning the post and leaving the Life Guards to deal with it. It was difficult, because – of course – many of our members were prepared to continue patrolling while fully aware of the risks. It made me realise how easy it is to make popular decisions – and how much more difficult it is to make unpopular ones.

With hindsight, we took the right actions early. The police closed Freshwater Beach in the early afternoon on 22 March and Council erected the Covid-19 signs. 

I am certain we will have a new season and would like to encourage you to renew your membership early to support the club and your patrol.

I hope you are all coping physically and mentally well with living with the current restrictions and that you and your loved ones are healthy and safe.

I look forward to seeing you all on the beach next season.

The Stats

Congratulations to yet another season with no life lost while Surf Life Savers were on duty. The fact that Freshwater is one of the safest beaches in New South Wales is a result of your vigilance, the countless preventative actions, the active engagement with members of the public, raising awareness of conditions with swimmers and surfers, and the application of your skills when incidents and injuries occur.







Patrol 5 won the Rescue of the Month award for March 2020 for the rescue of a surfer who turned out to have a C1 spinal fracture. C1 is the vertebrae at the top of the cervical spine. You can all imagine how critical the correct response and treatment of this patient was. The patient is expected to make a full recovery and credit goes to Ian Hill's team and Tom Duffy who happened to be the attending paramedic on the day.

We had a mass rescue during a training event, some swift board rescues and other slightly less dramatic spinal incidents, the usual fin chops, splinters, blue bottle stings and other cuts and bruises. All patients attended to were in good hands and made full recoveries and equally important, all our life savers were well and without injury.

According to Surfguard, despite the shortened season, Freshwater SLSC members patrolled for 8,333 hours. To put that into perspective, a year has – for most of us – between 220 and 230 eight-hour working days. That means our members have patrolled the full time equivalent of 4¹/₂ working years this season. That is impressive! I am sceptical about the 8 hours in April recorded on Surfguard in the graphic opposite and I am sure the number of board and IRB rescues was higher. I think this demonstrates that while we record the weather six time per day, more important information is not being captured with increased uptake of the SLSA Patrol App. One reason will be lack of familiarity with the app and the time it takes to find the path to enter the data. We'll need to explore how we can improve on the capture of data that represents our rescue and prevention activities more accurately.

Proficiencies – respectively the lack of proficiencies

We currently have 424 actively patrolling members, of which 84 are SRCs and 340 are Bronze and higher medallion members.


Of those, we have some members who are patrolling but who are not registered as proficient. Some of these are recording errors, where the proficiency has been attended, but not correctly recorded. However, there is a small number of members who are not proficient. This includes some SRCs who earned their award the previous season, but who were unaware of the requirement to undertake annual proficiencies.

I would like to remind all patrolling members of the need to undertake an annual Bronze proficiency. All SRCs, please also attend the Bronze proficiency. There is no special SRC proficiency.

The main concern for us is that you are not covered by our insurances, should you have an accident or injury while on patrol if you are not proficient. If you are not proficient, we will not allow you to attend patrol.

As we have some non-proficient members, we will aim to organise a proficiency at the beginning of next





season – Covid-19 allowing – so that you are able to patrol from the beginning of the season. I will contact those who are currently registered as non-proficient prior to the season to ensure there are no errors in our records and to let you know when we run our first proficiencies of the season.



Freshwater UAV Report

I extend my appreciation to Cheryl White, David Newhouse, Kelly Dobrow and Lachlan Brink who became UAV Operators last season and have carried out UAV Patrols this season in Support Operations.

What a phenomenal first year for UAV Operation in SNB. Our SNB

UAV training started in mid September and by early December I had around 50 newly endorsed UAV Operators in our Branch, and State have recognised SNB's successful and extraordinarily rapid increase in UAV Operators as well as fulfilling our UAV patrolling obligations to a very high level. I did have the advantage of having two of our Branch members being A380 Pilots and following my recommendation, they quickly became our UAV Facilitators after completing their UAV Facilitators Course.

UAVs have a very important role in surf rescue surveillance patrols and support operations. It is more than looking for 'marine creatures'. and is more to do with surf safety, identifying rips, people in trouble or potential trouble. UAV Operations is available to every SLS member and I encourage you to become a UAV Operator. Go to the SNB UAV webpage and download the UAV Operations Manual with links to training videos. In the future, each Club will have the opportunity to have their own UAV for additional surveillance and surf safety.

Patrol of the Year

On the last pre-Covid patrol, on 22 February, the patrol had 26 surf life savers on duty, complemented by substitutes and volunteers who made up hours missed on other patrols.

Being such a tight-knit team, it was great to see that the patrol welcomed the influx of younger newcomers this season, actively mentoring the SRCs and encouraging the new Bronze members to achieve higher awards.

On a personal note, I would like to thank all members of Patrol 15 for their friendship, guidance and encouragement. I remember humming and hawing whether to return the following season or not. That has stopped long ago – the loyalty to you, and your loyalty to the Club and the Patrol keeps me going.

In response to the imagined catcalls: I must admit that the awards at the end of the season weren't at the fore-front of my mind when I took on the

role of Club Captain. Now that I learned to get data quickly out of Surfguard and to avoid similar embarrassment next year, I'll plan to report the patrol statistics in the monthly newsletter and will solicit the support of the Patrol Captains to report newly earned awards of their patrol members.

To all members:

The most important criterium for the Patrol of the Year award is the number of No Shows. If you want to give your patrol a chance to be in contention for the award, please do arrange substitutes for the patrols you cannot attend or at least let your Patrol Captain know that you can't make it (giving you an "Excused" rather than a "No Show").

We had several patrols this season where we just met minimum requirements. Patrolling with five or six members on a busy day is difficult and can be stressful – it is not fun. Help your patrol and make surf life saving enjoyable for everyone by arranging substitutes.



Bronze Medallion (by Steve Davis)

This season there were 4 Bronze courses in total, three prior to Christmas 2019 and one large course in mid January 2020.

Course 1: As in prior years, Lindsay Davis undertook to clear the decks early of any Freshie cadet members (SRC's) who were or had turned 15 over the winter months and therefore were eligible to do their Bronze. Surf Rescue Certificates (SRC) (by Kelly Dobrow)

The 2019/2020 season saw 2 groups of Freshwater candidates gualify for their Surf Rescue Certificate award.

Course 1: The first intensive SRC course was run over 3 weeks and began in September 2019 with trainers, Kelly Dobrow, John Goldrick and Sue Walmsley. All 26 candidates successfully passed their SRC assessment on 22 September 2019 and were already patrolling prior to the unscheduled early close of the season. This was the first time an intensive 3 week format was trialled and it seemed to work well with this group of mostly existing Freshwater nippers who already had a couple of years of water skills under their belt.

Course 2: We also ran another SRC course starting on 16 October 2019 with trainers Kelly Dobrow, Andrew McEwen, Emily Lemlin, Tahlia Dearden and Tom Duffy (content expert on surf skills). All 15 candidates passed their assessment in challenging surf conditions at North Curl Curl on 17 November 2019.

This course comprised many nonnippers who did a great job building their surf skills and grasping the finer aspects of resuscitation and first aid. In fact, several members from this group (and a couple from a previous SRC group) joined together to form 4 Under 15 First Aid teams. These four teams competed at State and won the top 4 positions qualifying them to compete at Aussies.

The Surf Rescue Certificate is the entry level award into all of these members' lifesaving careers and it is important we make it as fun as possible. I think the smiles on these member's faces and the fact that just about all of them are patrolling say it all.

We set the course a little further than the advertised 1.5km to make sure everyone got value for money - and there were no complaints.

Our two fastest swimmers each received an awesome Speedo prize pack including backpack, costumes, goggles and caps. They were Ned Wieland age 18 (18m:18s) and Freshie's own Tamsyn Curley age 17 (20m:46s).

Carl Sorensen was the fastest Freshie member for the second year running (3rd overall) in a time of 18m:47s. Congratulations to Carl on winning the coveted Barney Mullins Shield.

A few key changes in structure this year gave the event a fresh face and

We used the front of the clubhouse to great effect, with an event results board proving a popular focal point for swimmers after the race.

The presentation area was dressed up with the Freshie sponsors backdrop and replica Dukes Board featuring prominently.

Post-race water was a far more environmentally friendly affair with biodegradable paper cups and water stations provided by the council.

We also took advantage of the large crowd on hand to hold an official launch of the recently donated IRB just before the start of the race.

The family of George "Barney" Mullins attended the Swim with great enthusiasm and commitment as they always do.

By all accounts, everyone enjoyed

the day, with the Barney Mullins Swim Classic now firmly established on the Ocean Swimming calendar as one of the favorite events of the year for swimmers.

Thanks to all our fabulous Freshwater SLSC members and their families for helping on the day making for another successful event. Special thanks must go to the each of the section heads for coordinating their areas so well.

The Swim is a significant fundraiser for the club, and this year we raised around \$14,500 from the day.

FACILITIES REPORT

This year the focus has been on maintaining the facility with minor upgrades and improvements for the benefit of our members.


Hand sanitisers, paper towel dispensers and signage were installed at key locations through-

We appointed our Club Captains from the UI4's for the season – Isabelle Stapf-Giannakis and Rio Nunura. Isabelle and Rio are great role models and did their very best to be an inspiration to the younger Nippers following in their footsteps. Congratulations and well done to you both.



The season saw continued success in the land events at carnivals which is a credit to our Land Coach Michelle Nunura and the commitment of our land competitors to their training. The Team took out 1st place in the All Age Beach Relay for the 2nd season in a row at Branch Titles in February along with a swag of gold, silver and bronze medals in individual and team events. Being one of the only surf sports events that is growing in numbers, it is an event that is looked forward to by all clubs with representation this year from clubs as far away as Broulee and solid numbers for this year's event which switched to a well received teams only format. The selection committee is particularly interested to see how his ski paddling progresses in the off season given his impressive performance on the ski at Palm Beach.

Despite the East Coast Masters not going ahead, Collaroy were generous enough to put on \$5 pints the day the competition was meant to be held, so a small team led by Sigi Hill, Peter Block and myself represented the Maroon and White well.

With the Branch and East Coast Masters cancelations, our attention turned to the State and then at that stage – Aussies. A crack group of 16 masters overcame late withdrawals, illness, old age, work commitments and a general lack of training and ability to turn in some great results at the State Titles held at Blacksmiths finishing 21st overall. As they did last year, the two Steves, (Bennett and Davis – AKA Little Steps and Blaster) kept the crowd enthralled late in the day with an effort in the double ski that could be best termed as "Bradburyesque" to claim a bronze in the 60–64 double and only just missing out on the gold. The theory sections of the Branch Championships were held at Branch HQ, however as the physical events did not go ahead no results were awarded. Very disappointing.

At the State Championships we had some excellent results with Lucas finishing 1st and Harry 4th in the Open Male and Andrea finishing 5th in the Open Female. Luke finished 3rd in the Under 15 Male – a big personal improvement for him.

Mabel, Bella and Kirra threw themselves into training for Champion Lifesaver, an event that has seen so many of our U14 competitors not only enjoy but be very successful in. The experience from Branch set them up for participation in the State Titles. After a hectic day of competition at Swansea, Kirra was named the silver medal winner. RESCUE & RESUSCITATION

The Freshie R&R machine, Defending their Aussie titles were keen But they could not compete And repeat last year's feat Because of that blasted COVID -19.

Well what a season 2019-20 turned out to be. Noteworthy perhaps for what didn't happen rather than what did, with the cancellation of the Branch and Australian championships. However that is not to say there weren't some highlights and outstanding efforts from this tight knit band of reel lifesavers.

The end of 2018-19 season saw the retirement from competition of Libby Murphy and Alan Burns. In their stead, Kelly Dobrow re-joined the Open Women's team and Wayne Freakley the Open Men's team and it was like they had never been away.

While scheduled to be a long season (28 Sept-26 April), the reality is, with the effect of Covid-19, it culminated with the State Championships on March 7 at Blacksmiths Beach.

During the course of the season the squad contended with changes to team compositions and disrupted training schedules. Perhaps the most noticeable being with Jarrad Freakley, long time competitor since 2006/07 being stationed as a Paramedic at Sawtell, His absence affected the Open Men's 5 person and Open 6 person teams. This made training and competition schedules extremely difficult. While getting to some training sessions, he could only commit to the Aussie championships. As things ultimately transpired, he never carried a reel, marched or swam in the battle of competition: a legacy of the novel corona virus.

One person's closure is another's opening and so it was for Seb Di Sano. With Jarrad out of the water, swimmer options were explored within the squad. Fortunately there is a depth of talent within this group. From the competitive swimmer options who would it be to fill the 6 person vacancy: Chris, Seb or Pat?

To maintain the competitive edge, Seb emerged as the man most likely to help the squad succeed. To that end he took on learning the No 2 & 6 positions, as well as committing to belt training sessions on Tuesday afternoons.

Our 2019/20 season kicked off at the Manly carnival on Sat Jan 25, continuing at Freshie on Jan 26. With work commitments, holiday arrangements and health issues affecting our teams, we were forced to improvise, adapt and overcome. This became our mantra for the season.

Hugo stepped in for Jarrad and Pat for Ian in the Open Men's team, Seb stepped in as a swimmer in the Open 6. At Freshwater Grace stepped in for Bec in the Open women's team and Lysa for Bec in the Open Mixed. As a testament to the strength of our squad, despite those substitutes, all teams won their respective events across the weekend.

Our domination in the water continued. With the exception of one event, Freshwater claimed all belt and tube races across the weekend. He then went on to convincingly claim the race ahead of the other competitors.


Hopefully the 2020-21 Age managers will be able to assist in recruiting some junior teams to wear the maroon and white in this area of competition.

This team were hoping to shake off their 'bridesmaids' reputation and finally conquer this event. However, for the 4th year in a row a Freshwater Women's team won the State silver medal. This year's achievement being particularly impressive as Kelly Dobrow has only this season re-joined the team after an absence of 4 years from R & R competition.

In making her return she was required to learn the vagaries of the No. 3 position – something she did with enthusiasm and commitment.

The competition in the Open Women's event is particularly strong. At the State championships, unlike Seb in the 6 person event, who romped his competitors in the run across the bank, Clare gave too much away and was forced to make up for it in the swim. All those 50x50m on the 50s combined with her belt training certainly served to minimise her perambulatory shortcomings. While the Wanda swimmer swam like a fish to win the swim from a fast closing Clare, it was Collaroy who won gold on the day.

Following this result the women were inspired to improve on their performance for Aussies particularly given the closeness of the score. However that competition outcome will forever remain a mystery – but as things have transpired, this team also remains the reigning Australian champions at the close of the 2019– 20 season.

This season we celebrated a unique event. Australia's longest continuously run local Masters Carnival, **'The Freshie Masters'**.

Twenty-five years ago, a young Ross Parry had the foresight to provide a platform for Masters to participate and compete in, ensuring they continued to have an opportunity to practice their SLSA skills in a warm and friendly environment. In 2019 we celebrated this with near-perfect conditions and attendance.

The 2019 Freshie Masters, brought to you by the Harbord Beach Hotel (HBH), is Australia's most attended local Masters Carnival. In 2017 we decided to shift the emphasis from a regular carnival of approximately 5-6 hours duration and make a shift to a Teams focus event that could be completed in a 3-3½hr schedule. What we have continued to see and receive feedback from, is that this format works. Numbers continue to increase, more clubs from outside the Sydney Northern Beaches (SNB) Branch attend, and participants endorse the format.

Sean King and the Harbord Beach Hotel put forward \$2,000 in prize money that, without question, became the biggest purse for any Masters Carnival in NSW history. Importantly, this prize purse allows Teams to celebrate their participation back at the Hotel – with a

generous tab. As each year demonstrates The Freshie Masters format wins converts from far and wide. Our sincerest thanks to the HBH for supporting us over many, many years.

In 2019 we also saw 100 years of March Past and 40 years of Women in SLSA – so our celebrations were extra special. Our congratulations to Manly LSC taking out the 'Ross Parry Cup' who demonstrated that sheer numbers and ensuring every event was filled with one or two Teams made all the difference. We introduced the 'Dash for Cash' for the U/50 and O/50, with equal prize money. A world-first sprint from the Surf Cans, body surf to the shore and sprint up the beach proved to be a real winner and will be back in 2020.

We also saw the passing of the baton this year with Ross stepping back from the helm after 25 years of dedication to the Masters cause. From generations of grateful Masters, thanks, Ross.


